"The Superiority of the New Covenant in Christ Jesus" Hebrews 8: 1-13

The writer of Hebrews has gone to great lengths to establish hope in the lives of his readers. They were on the brink of losing hope. They had been enlightened), they had tasted of the heavenly gift and had been made partakers of the Holy Spirit and tasted the good word of God and the powers of the age to come (6:4-5). But when persecution came, they wanted to go back to their comfort zone. They wanted to go back to Judaism. At least there, they wouldn't be executed for being a Christian. Their families might even take them back. They might even be able to make more money and regain their social standing.

The author is trying to drive home the "main point" (8:1). It's like he's taking their faces in both of his hands, looking them right in the eyes and saying, "This is the main point."
